By working directly with local communities, we ensure that our educational projects are relevant to their needs.

We believe that access to education is not just a basic human right, but a key factor in reducing child labor and poverty. In HWF, we strive to bring the un-enrolled children back to school seats, we build and reconstruct schools and educational facilities and ensure to create a healthy teaching environment.

INSTITUTIONS UNDER HWF MANAGEMENT

Human Welfare Foundation is currently running five Schools under its direct management.

The Scholar School, New Delhi

The Scholar School is located at Abul Fazal Enclave, Okhla in New Delhi. 678 students are studying in the classes from nursery level to eighth standard. The school has employed 39 staffs and is performing well in both curricular and co-curricular activities. Construction of the second floor of Gazal Block has been completed and the work of Afzal Hussain Block was started during this period. A Reverse Osmosis water system was installed in the school.



The Scholar School, Howrah

The Scholar School is a residential campus located at Howrah in West Bengal. 193 students are studying in the classes from nursery level to eighth standard. The school has employed 35 staffs.



The Scholar School, Guwahati

The Scholar School is located at Guwahati, Assam has 350 students studying in the classes from nursery level to eighth standard. The school has employed 29 staffs. The construction of the semi-permanent building with 10 class rooms is under progress. The state government granted prior-permission to run classes upto higher secondary level as well as the No-Objection Certificate (NOC) for affiliation of the CBSE.

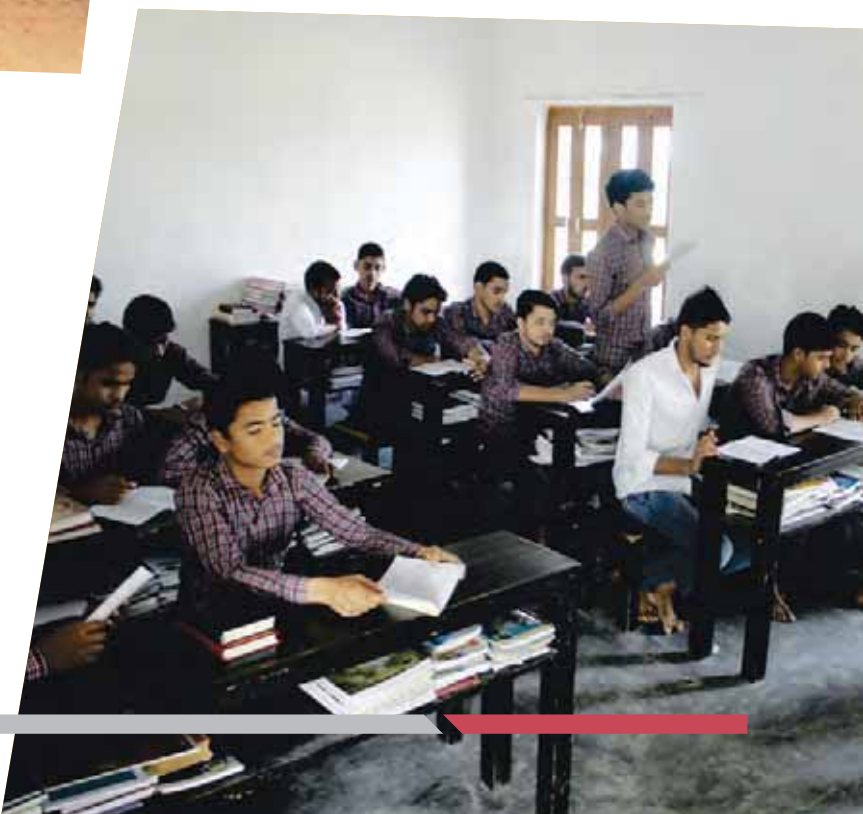


The Millennium Girls School Hazaribagh

The Millennium Girls School is a Secondary Level school located in Hazaribagh, Jharkhand. 280 students are studying in the classes from nursery level to tenth standard. The school has employed 32 staffs. It has obtained provisional affiliation of the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) during this period.

Al-Jamia Al-Islamia Mewat Campus, Haryana

Al Jamia Al Islamia is an Islamic University in Shantapuram, Kerala. Its off-campus was established in 2016 at Mewat, Haryana under HWF. 40 students are studying in the classes of Eleventh and Twelfth. A staff of 8 is working in the campus. The construction of Primary School is still under progress in the campus.

MERIT CUM MEANS SCHOLARSHIP



Every year Human Welfare Foundation provides Undergraduate (UG) and Post-Graduate (PG) students Merit-cum-Means Scholarships based on their academic performance, economic background and social commitment.

During the year 2018-19, HWF received 1,852 applications from 19 states. A total number of 342 students were selected out of 679 students, who appeared in the interview sessions held during October 2018 to January 2019. HWF continued to provide scholarships for 93 students, who were qualified during 2017-18.

Special Scholarships

Supporting students to pursue higher education from prestigious institutions of India and abroad, is one of the goals of HWF. In order to facilitate such financial support, HWF provides scholarships and payment of fee to the concerned students at their request. During the year 2018-2019, HWF supported 13 students with financial help of Rs.8,14,000.



AWARDS FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Awards For Academic Excellence is a benchmark initiative of HWF to encourage Muslim students to perform better in future. It is meant to motivate them to perform excellently in their academics. Awards for Academic Excellence are being presented, on the basis of merit, to bright children from every state who have passed Class Xth Examination with outstanding Marks.

Awards are given in the form of Merit Certificate along with a Token Cash Prize of INR 1,000 each in an exclusive Awards Distribution Ceremony. It is organized at state level in an arranged program with Career Guidance Lectures, and is attended by the award recipients, their parents and prominent figures from the community. During 2018-19, HWF presented 566 awards in West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Assam and Haryana.



TALENT IDENTIFICATION & ITS MENTORSHIP (NMTSE)

Human Welfare Foundation has been conducting NMTSE (National Minority Talent Search Examination) since 2011 to empower the students from Minority communities through their proportional representation in the academic excellence of NTSE (National Talent Search Examination) and other competitive examinations. We mentor the selected students and try to make them capable to choose their career as per their skills, aptitude and personality and prepare them for competitive examinations. HWF has prepared a comprehensive process of examination including formulation of question papers, coordination and invigilation of exams, and declaration of results. The meritorious students of NMTSE are felicitated in state level Award Functions.

During the period of 2018-19, HWF conducted follow-up programs for the previous year's toppers. HWF has developed a mentorship program for the selected NMTSE students. During this period, students of 2015-16 and 2016-17 batches have attended the mentorship programs under trained counsellors. Career Guidance Lectures were organized for 230 students in Ghafoori Memorial Inter College, Meerut, Uttar Pradesh and Milli Model School, Jamia Nagar, New Delhi. HWF organized felicitation programs in Bihar, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh and Delhi and psychometric Tests and counseling sessions were arranged for 224 students.



SCHOOL BAG DISTRIBUTION

The number of children dropping out school is increasing every year in our country. The obvious reason is that their parents cannot afford to buy necessary school appliances in order to send them to schools. HWF strives for incorporation of these children to education at local schools by distributing them school bags containing books and stationary. It promotes active participation of children with social vulnerability in various academic activities in order to minimize dropouts. During the period of 2018-19, HWF distributed bags to 2,030 students of six states across India.



CAREER GUIDANCE CENTRE

Human Welfare Foundation under Vision 2026 started the Career Guidance Centre at HWF Headquarters, New Delhi.





HEALTHCARE

Human Welfare Foundation (HWF) implements a wide array of health and nutrition projects, providing basic and supplementary medical services for populations in dire need. HWF is committed to the provision of quality healthcare and nutrition to those who need it the most. Our Health and Medical programs aim to provide primary healthcare facilities for those who are deprived of this basic necessity.

HWF also conducts training for doctors, provides hospital medical equipment and develop health awareness programs. Our other projects include organizing medical camps, blood donation camps, donating medicines and providing low cost mobile and clinic-based healthcare facilities for the poor in rural areas.

HOSPITAL

AL SHIFA MULTI SPECIALITY HOSPITAL

Al Shifa Multispeciality Hospital, located at Abul Fazal Enclave in New Delhi, focuses on healthcare and community development services at an affordable cost. The hospital is managed by Human Welfare Trust (HWT) under Vision 2026. Al-Shifa Hospital ensures better healthcare services for the welfare of around two million people mainly belonging to lower middle income groups of the Muslim Community residing in its adjacent areas.

Al Shifa Multi-speciality Hospital facilitates **20** departments including diagnostic centres with a total number of **342** qualified staffs. It provided **5,206** dialysis services with lowest rate in New Delhi. In collaboration with the Government of Delhi, Al Shifa Hospital is running a free vaccination centre with **1,183** beneficiaries. During the period 2018-19, around **95,940** people were the beneficiaries of hospital services and **11,668** poor patients have utilized its free services.



MEDICAL CENTRES

Vision 2026 manages **7** Medical Centres in Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, Assam, Telangana and West Bengal. Around **66,291** patients benefited from the healthcare services provided. Two new medical centres were inaugurated at Howli in Assam on 01 February 2019 and Kaithwaliya in Uttar Pradesh on 15 March 2019. The construction of medical centre at Bareilly, Uttar Pradesh was started during 2018-19.



MEDICAL CAMPS

76 Medical Camps were organised by Vision 2026 in Uttar Pradesh, New Delhi, Haryana, Gujarat and other parts of the country during the year 2018-19. A total of **9,056** people benefited from these camps.



BLOOD DONATION CAMPS

We organized **14** Blood Donation Camps during the year 2018-19 in West Bengal, Jharkhand and other parts of the country. **770** people donated their blood in these camps. 12 Medical Camps were organized in association with our partner Medical Service Society of India (MSS).



DIAGNOSTIC CENTRES

Two Diagnostic Centres are running under Vision 2026 namely Falah-e-Aam Diagnostic Centre at Meerut in Uttar Pradesh and Sahayak Diagnostic Centre at Rajarhat in West Bengal. During the year 2018-19, a total of **6,834** people availed services at an affordable cost from these diagnostic centres.



VACCINATION PROGRAM

HWF has been running Free Vaccination programs in Uttar Pradesh and New Delhi (in collaboration with CDMO) since January 2018. **3,533** people benefitted from these programs.

HEALTH TRAINING PROGRAM

HWF organized a two-day health training program for volunteers of Model Village Project in Kolkata, West Bengal. **40** volunteers participated this training program from Assam, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh.



MOBILE MEDICAL VAN

A Mobile Medical Van was flagged off by Shri Arvind Kejriwal, Honorable Chief Minister of Delhi on 2 November, 2018. It's a joint venture of Human Welfare Foundation, Aster DM Foundation and Al-Shifa Multi-speciality Hospital. HWF organized around **185** Mobile Medical Camps in last 5 months, benefitting **12,765** patients.



MEDICAL AID TO POOR PATIENTS

13 patients were provided with financial aid worth Rs. 2,41,000 for their healthcare needs. This is in addition to the support we provided to the needy at our Hospitals and Medical Centres.

SPECIAL MEDICAL AID

HWF is providing special medical support to the children with rare and crippling diseases in Aligarh and Agra. Three children are suffering from the 'Delayed Milestone Problem'. HWF is taking care of their treatment.

Six children from Agra are affected by a rare muscle disease. HWF is taking care of their healthcare and education.

No human can live alone, we need our family, friends and community around us in every phase of our life. Unfortunately, we often forget that our community needs our help too to attain a better tomorrow.

Small acts of kindness can go a long way to bring a smile on someone's face. It costs little, yet does a lot. This is the reason why Human Welfare Foundation, through Vision 2026 program, is engaged in helping the poor and destitute.

DRINKING WATER PROJECT

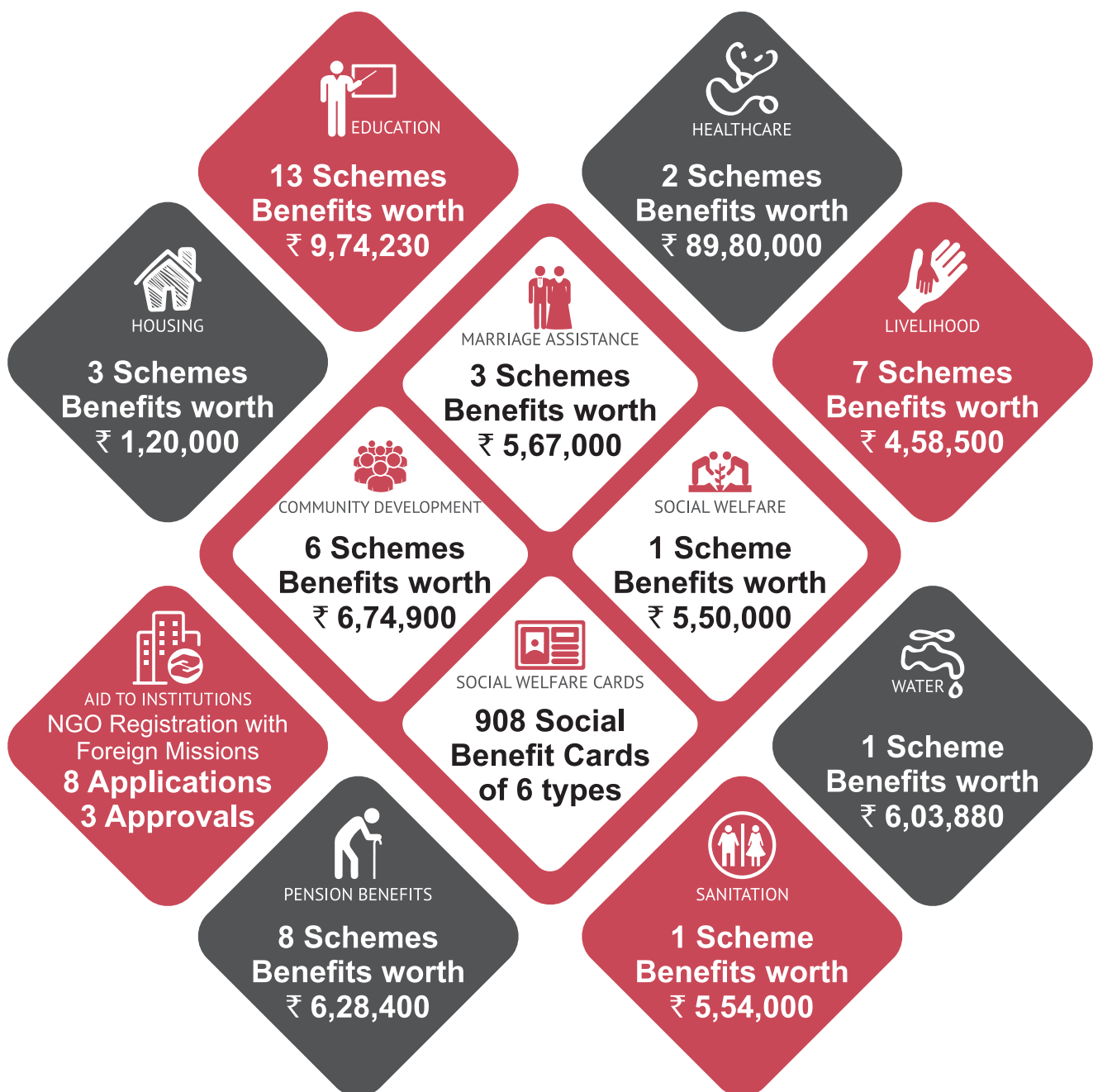
Water is a basic human necessity and a vital natural resource necessary for all aspects of life. Unfortunately, the fundamental right of accessing clean water has been denied to many of the poorest people in the world. Human Welfare Foundation recognizes the critical importance of the issue and focuses on the most-affected areas to tackle water crisis by providing people with sources of clean water. A total number of 109 Drinking Water Projects such as Submersibles, Hand Pumps, Open Wells and Reverse Osmosis System have been completed and around 68,000 people have benefited. These projects were implemented in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Haryana, Delhi, Jharkhand, Assam, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and West Bengal.



Nagrik Vikas Kendra (NVK) is an ambitious initiative of Human Welfare foundation. NVK works as a bridging agency between the underprivileged and the government bodies to reap the benefit of welfare schemes of central and state governments. The serious issues of lack of awareness, lack of political will, corruption and mismanagement are keeping the poor away from the system of welfare schemes in our country. Currently **14** Nagrik Vikas Kendras are working in Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, West Bengal, Jharkhand, Assam and Rajasthan, in which 7 centres were newly established during the term 2018-19. In the same period, NVK successfully worked on fifty schemes and submitted the applications for Rs. 16,08,40,930. It helped to avail **Rs. 1,41,10,910** and **908** welfare scheme cards like ration card, job cards etc for the poor. Apart from the schemes our Kendras assisted the beneficiaries to get **4,214** necessary documents of 12 types.

COMMUNITY CENTRES

HWF believes that every community needs a space to improve their cultural and social development. To achieve this goal, HWF facilitates funds the construction and maintenance of Community Centres across the country. **26** projects were completed and **13** new projects were started during the period 2018-2019. HWF maintains 6 Community Learning Centres (CLC) in the most-disadvantaged areas for 500 students.

LOW COST HOUSING AID

India is home to the largest homeless population in the world. People living, eating and sleeping on the streets is a regular site in India. Millions of poor people who cannot afford to arrange a shelter end up on the footpaths and flyovers of flourishing metros of India. HWF provides financial aid to homeless people living in the least-developed villages in various North Indian states. Victims of natural calamities are given priority under the housing aid project. During 2018-2019, HWF constructed **59** houses in Bihar, Rajasthan, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh and Haryana.





SOCIAL WELFARE

HWF believes in ensuring humanitarian services to everyone at the time of necessities. It involves in the field of social welfare with an aim of empowerment and poverty alleviation. HWF manages various projects of seasonal activities in every year and delivers better results in the society. HWF mainly focuses on the fields of social services as follows:

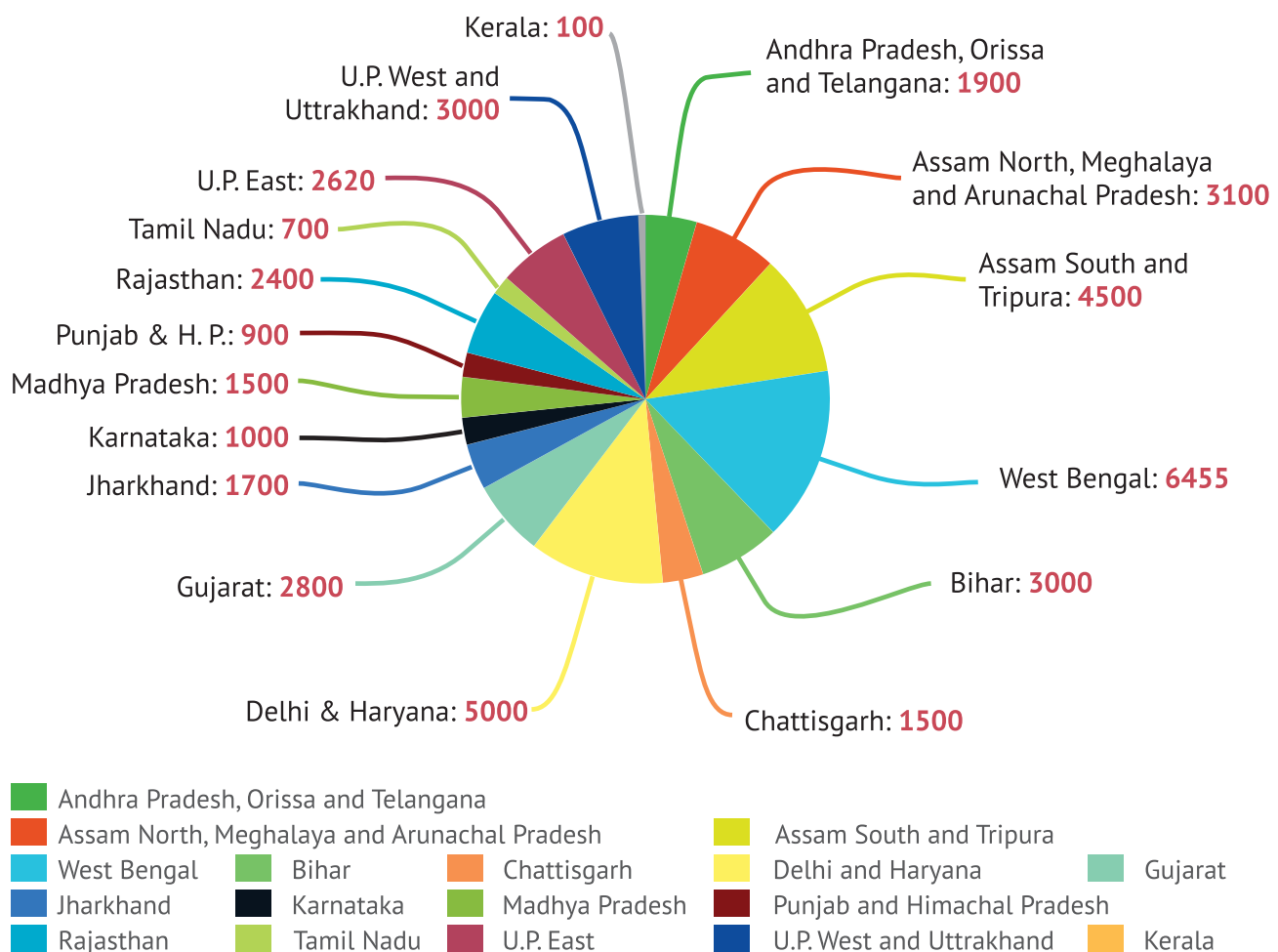

EID-AL-ADHA CELEBRATION WITH THE NEEDY

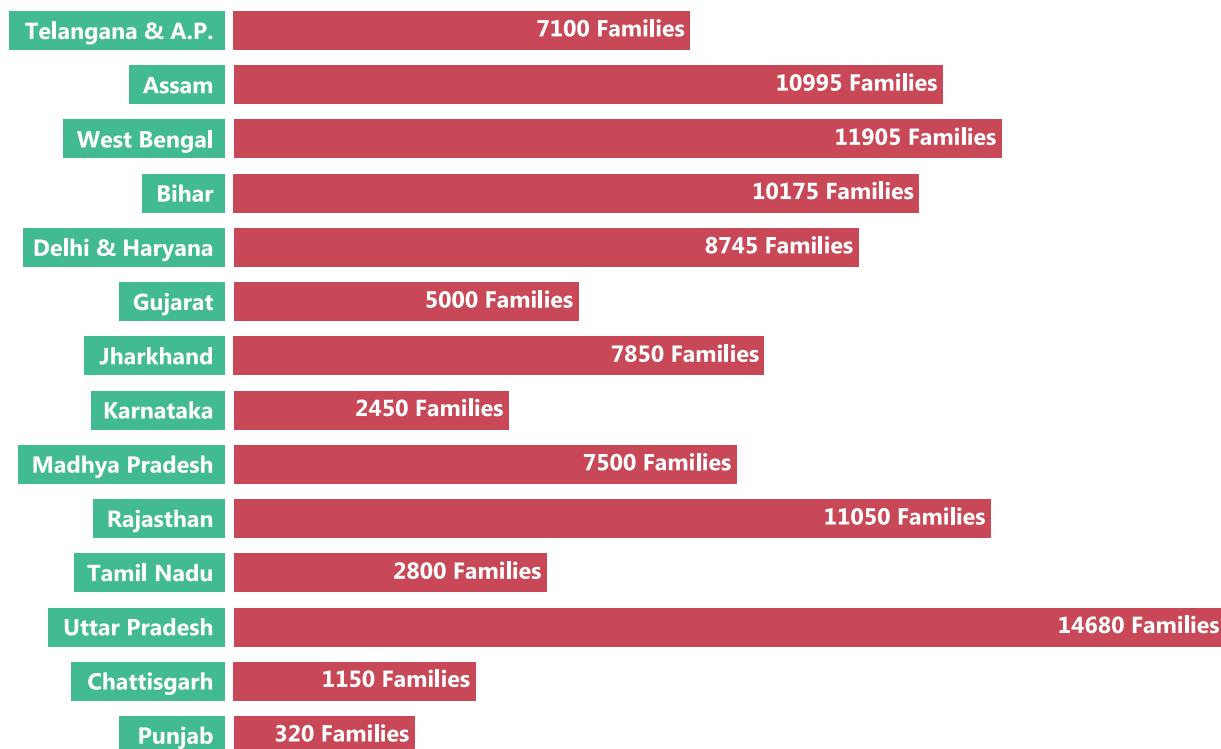

We ensure that those who receive Adhahi food aid are among the most vulnerable in their communities, which include widows, orphans, elders, internally displaced persons, refugees and the poor. HWF distributed Adhahi food packets to 1,01,690 families of 16 states across the country.

REFUGEE RELIEF PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation along with Society for Bright Future have been working for the betterment of the Rohingya refugees with the support of Well wishers and international agencies. According to official records, more than 20,677 (UNHCR - December 2018) Rohingya refugees are living in India. Majority of them are living in a very miserable condition in Delhi, Jammu, Mewat and Hyderabad. To improve their socio-economic conditions, HWF and SBF have implemented major projects in refugee concentrated areas. HWF is keeping a good rapport with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) India to facilitate needful support for refugees in India.



COORDINATION GROUP MEETING

HWF conducted a Coordination Group Meeting in association with the UNHCR to support Rohingya Refugees at HWF Headquarters, New Delhi. Prominent personalities and Refugee activists attended and deliberated upon the future plan of action.

EMERGENCY RELIEF

HWF has been working for relief and support to the refugees during emergency situations such as fire outbreak, scarcity of resources and demolition of shelters. During 2018-19, when two refugee camps in Kanchan Kunj, New Delhi and Chandeni, Haryana were gutted by fire, HWF provided emergency relief in coordination with UNHCR.



FOOD AND CLOTH DISTRIBUTION

During 2018-19, HWF volunteers organized a Food and cloth campaign for Rohingya families. HWF organized a well arranged distribution of food kits, clothes and blankets for 412 refugees at Rohingya camps in Haryana and New Delhi.



SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

HWF is running 3 Skill Development Centres for Refugee women and girls in order to provide basic training programs for livelihood. HWF distributed 12 sewing Machines for Rohingya widows at Mewat, Haryana.



RAMADAN RELIEF PROGRAM

During the month of Ramadan, HWF distributed food kits for 200 refugee families from Myanmar, Afghanistan, Somalia and Sudan.



MONSOON RELIEF

HWF organized Monsoon relief programs for refugees and distributed mosquito nets and medical kits for 141 Rohingya refugee families.



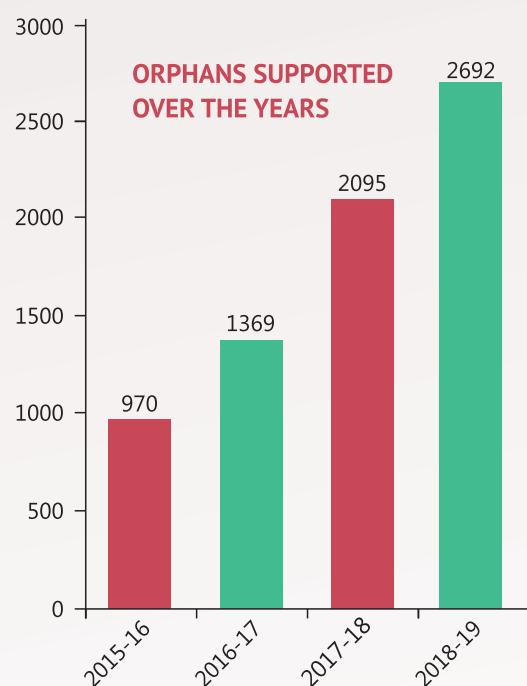
ORPHAN CARE

While looking at our surroundings, we can witness that the orphaned children are the most vulnerable part of our society. They are often left in the care of elderly relatives, who do not have the ability to support them with their meager income. Consequently these orphans receive no education and are driven into work at a very early age, while missing out a genuine childhood and education. This obviously affects them for the rest of their lives and they are left behind the achievements of social standards.

Orphan Care Program of Human Welfare Foundation is designed to address the needs of orphans and improve their living standards, in a way that respects and preserves the customs and traditions of the communities in which they reside. Through Orphan Care Program we not only assist orphans and needy children, but also support the communities in which they live.

Under the Orphan Care Program, we support

construction and maintenance of Orphanages as well as disbursing monthly financial support to orphan children living with their families and relative. Currently, 2,692 orphans are receiving monthly financial assistance under the Orphan Care Program.



ORPHAN SCHOLARSHIP DISTRIBUTION

Orphan Care Department arranged Orphan Scholarship distribution programs at the level of agencies and individuals in 15 states across India. A total number of 2011 scholarships were distributed under the sponsorship of individuals and charitable agencies.



WORLD ORPHAN DAY

As part of World Orphan Day, HWF conducted various programs on 15th Ramadan (31 May 2018) at 11 places across the country. Around 600 orphans participated in get-togethers with their families and received Eid gifts.



ORPHANAGES

Human Welfare Foundation is currently running 7 orphanages across the country. During 2018-19, three new orphanages were inaugurated at **Rargaon** in Jharkhand, **Joharpur** in West Bengal and **Siswa** in Bihar.





ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

India is the fastest growing major economy in the world today. Despite this fact, one in every five Indians is poor. 22 percent of the population or 270 million people are living below the poverty line. Muslims, the largest minority community, who make up 14.2% of India's 1.25 billion population, come out pretty much at the bottom of most socio-economic indices.

HWF's Vision 2026 addresses the root-causes of poverty through long-term solutions and believes in promoting sustainable livelihoods. It believes that sustainable livelihood is a way of earning a living that empowers people to become self-sufficient and less reliant on humanitarian aid. HWF works hard to empower the rural population through technical training and self employment projects.



VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTRES

HWF establishes Vocational Training Centres (VTC) and Skill Development Centres (SDC) to provide short-time job-oriented courses. These courses are formulated to make the youth capable of getting job opportunities at various fields. Currently, HWF runs 8 training centres by offering courses such as Auxiliary Nursing Midwifery (ANM), Computer Training and Tailoring Training for around 250 students.



SELF EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

In order to empower the rural population, HWF conducts self-employment programs at various places. HWF provided necessary facilities to 229 poor persons to earn their income through Sewing Machines, Cycle Rickshaws and Wheel Carts.





WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

Women make up two-thirds of all non-literates in the world and obviously, they are not achieving any considerable proportion in the higher education across the globe. At the same time, supporting women in the developing countries is vital to help the families to overcome critical social issues such as poverty and unemployment.

By empowering women and giving them access to opportunities in the fields of education, employment and health care, the whole society will get benefits. By supporting women to achieve new heights, we can control cycle of poverty and infant mortality rate. Educating female child would ensure more equitable tomorrows.

In India, women are born into a society that creates barriers of social inequalities. HWF aims to assist in women empowerment through various educational, healthcare and

income initiatives and to empower rural women by educating them in order to access the opportunities available to them.

One of the key goals of the Human Welfare Foundation is the empowerment of women from poor and marginalised sections of the society. Almost 50 per cent of the beneficiaries of the HWF activities are women. Around half of the scholarship fund goes to female students. We organise following programs:

GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation and Women Manifesto jointly organized Guidance and Counseling programs for girls through schools and community centres. School based programs give a platform to cover the adolescent girls, whereas community level programs focus to cover non-school going girls, their parents and other stakeholders. Programs consist of sessions on different topics as career guidance, personality development, stress and Time management techniques, social and legal Awareness. During this period both organizations jointly organized guidance and counseling programs at five places. Around 100 girls and women attended the programs.



SOCIO-LEGAL AWARENESS PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation in association with Women's Manifesto organized Socio-Legal Awareness Programs for Women at five places. A total number of 220 women have participated in this program.



HEALTH AWARENESS PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation and Women Manifesto jointly organized Health Awareness Programs at 14 places across Delhi. Around 575 girls and women have attended the program.



CHILD DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Human Welfare Foundation in association with Women's Manifesto organized Child Development Programs at four places. A total number of 176 women have participated in this program.

SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Skill Development Centre under HWF at Shram Vihar, Shaheen Bagh ha been conducting Tailoring and stitching training and literacy program regularly since August 2018. 14 students are getting training in stitching and 8 students are learning Hindi.



WOMEN LEADERSHIP PROGRAM



Human Welfare Foundation in association with Women's Manifesto organized a one-week 'Women Leadership Program' on 09-16 February 2019 at HWF Headquarters, New Delhi. Ira Singhal IAS (UPSC topper-2014), Dr Neelam Sukhrmani, Dr Habeebul Rahiman (Faculties of Department of Social Work, Jamia Millia Islamia) and T. Arifali, HWF General Secretary addressed the participants. This program was designed to develop leadership quality, enhance knowledge, and learn real-time techniques of problem solving. The program included both theory and practice, in accordance to this, the schedule designed lectures, motivation classes, institutional visits, urban and rural community visits and research report publication. Fifteen women successfully completed the training program and six other women were part of the same. The program facilitated field visits to the Delhi Minorities Commission, Delhi Commission for Women, Khwazakhela Village of Mewat in Haryana and Shram Vihar, New Delhi.



GRAMEEN DOSTI VILLAGE DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Under Grameen Dosti Village Development Project, efforts are being made to improve the Socio-Economic condition of residents of the selected villages with better accessibility to health, education and livelihood. 68.9% of India's population lives in rural areas. Though this number is expected to fall in the coming years, it is still estimated that more than half of our population would be rural even in 2050. Despite there being several initiatives by governments at all levels, the level of improvement has not kept pace with the rising aspirations. On most of the development parameters, there is still a significant gap between rural and urban India. One reason for the failure of rural development schemes has been the lack of a holistic focus on the village as a unit. Separate flagship

schemes targeting different sectors such as health (National Rural Health Mission), education (Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan) and livelihood (National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, National Rural Livelihood Mission) have been launched in the past, but met with limited success.

After the release of the Sachar Committee report, we have realized the inadequate performance of government schemes in the field of village empowerment, in order to tackle this huge challenge, HWF has planned to

cover more than 100 villages across the Northern India under its flagship program VISION 2026. During the year 2018-19, a total number of 27 villages were selected under this project. Basic surveys have been completed and the project started in 22 villages.

CIVIL RIGHTS PROTECTION

According to HRW report, India has "significant human rights problems". Lack of accountability for security forces and impunity for abusive policing including "police brutality, extrajudicial killings, and torture" are major problems.

HWF tries to address these problems in order to alleviate the sufferings of the victims by engaging with a network of advocates, social activists and grassroots-level para-legal social workers. Some of our very basic but important interventions are given below:

RESPONDING TO EMERGENCIES

HWF believes in ensuring safety and basic necessities to all individuals in an emergency situation. During the times of inescapable consequences of emergencies, such as forcible displacement and human rights violations, the affected people including women and children need helping hands. Hence, the emergency responses must be capable of meeting their immediate needs. Our disaster management activities are coordinated under the banner of Society for Bright Future (SBF).

Society for Bright Future (SBF), a national level disaster management organisation, was formed as part of Vision 2016 program. SBF specializes in Emergency Relief and Rehabilitation and has quickly responded to all natural and man-made disasters in the recent past.

The Emergency and Relief program of SBF includes providing survival items like food,

water, clothes, shelter and medical care during emergencies. It involves the training programs in order to prepare for and to cope with disasters. The Rehabilitation program includes medical assistance to the injured people, reconstruction of residential and commercial properties of the affected population and employment assistance.

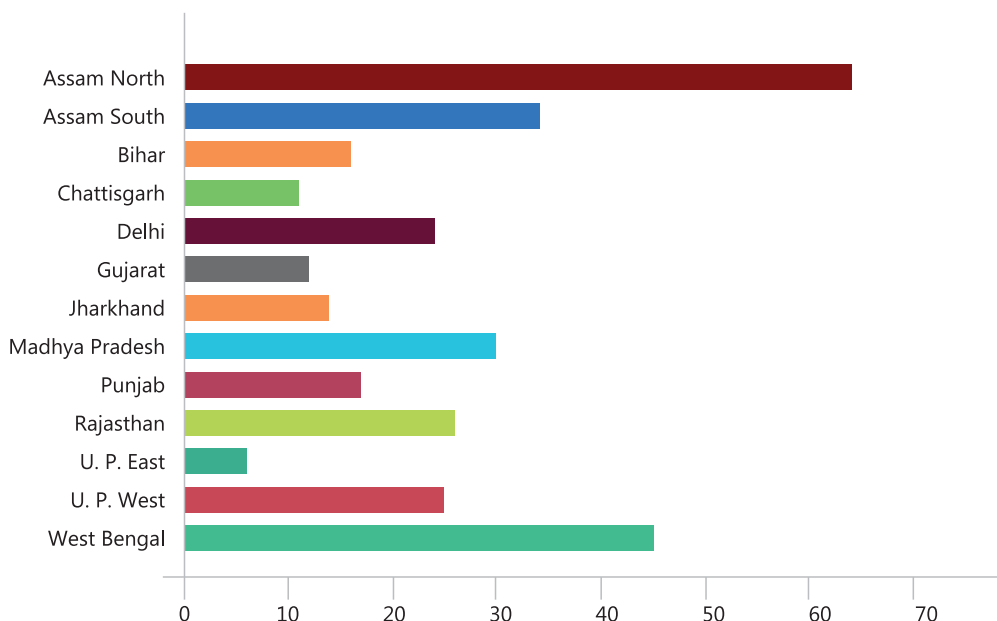

TRAINING OF VOLUNTEERS

SBF provides training to the prospective volunteers in its relief works. During 2018-19 SBF organized training workshops which were attended by 325 registered volunteers from 13 states/ zones of India.



FLOOD RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

• FLOOD IN KERALA

The hazardous flood in Kerala during August 2018 drastically affected lakhs of people. Society for Bright Future reached out to Kerala with donation as well as rehabilitation support by a group of 27 volunteers for six days. They managed to clean houses, wells, offices, schools and religious institutions and distributed relief kits.



• FLOOD IN ASSAM

SBF visited flood affected areas of Assam South which are Hailakandi, Karimganj, Cachar, and neighbouring state Tripura. After conducting a detailed survey, SBF distributed food kits, cloth and necessary facilities.



HOUSING PROJECT, WEST BENGAL

The housing project under flood rehabilitation in West Bengal was started in April 2018. The project is going to be implemented in North and South Dinajpur, West Bengal.



PLANTATION PROGRAM

As a part of environmental awareness, SBF organized Plantation Programs titled 'Go Green' in the states of Punjab, Assam, Chhattisgarh and West Bengal.



CLEANLINESS CAMPAIGN



SBF organized cleanliness awareness programs related to Swachh Bharat Abhiyan (Clean India Mission) and Shramdan (Cleanliness work) in Jharkhand, Assam, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh.

EMERGENCY RELIEF

- **Relief for Refugee Fire Victims in Delhi**

A massive fire broke out in Kanchan Kunj, Delhi on 15 April, 2018. Nearly 250 Rohingya refugees were rendered homeless. SBF arranged first aid at Al Shifa Hospital and distributed relief kits.



• Survey and Relief for Fire Victims

A team of 5 SBF volunteers visited Madanpur Khadar, New Delhi, where many shanties had been burnt to ashes by a massive fire on 14 May 2018. The team conducted a detailed survey of the area, met with victims and asked them about their condition and losses during the fire, are distributed food kits and cloth for the fire victims.



• Relief for Fire Victims in Delhi & Gujarat

SBF immediately reached to the fire accident area of Dhobi Ghat in Delhi on 7 February 2019 and formed coordination committees with the help of students from Jamia Millia Islamia. SBF distributed necessary facilities and built temporary shelters.

SBF organized emergency relief for fire victims of Chandola Lake in Ahmedabad on 2 March 2019 and 70 families benefited from it.

• Relief for Storm Victims in Haryana

SBF distributed 160 cement sheets to 40 families for storm victims of Palwal in Haryana on 5 March 2019.

• Emergency Relief for Train Accident Victims

Soon after the train accident in Amritsar, Punjab, on the eve of Dussehra 19 October 2018, SBF volunteers met the victims and distributed necessary facilities.



ANNUAL REVIEW WORKSHOP

SBF organized an Annual Review cum Planning Workshop for its Conveners/Asst. Conveners from 13 states on 16-17 March 2019 at SBF Headquarters, New Delhi. State conveners presented annual reports of the year 2018-19.

WINTER RELIEF

Society for Bright Future (SBF) and HWF together provide Blankets and Quilts for winter relief to the poor and needy families across the North Indian states in every year. During the year 2018-19, a total number of 19,749 blankets were distributed in 14 states. SBF organized a cloth distribution program for the homeless people in Delhi, in which 100 persons received necessary dress items.



WORKSHOP FOR WOMEN

A one-day Workshop for Women on Domestic Risk Management was organized by Society for Bright Future, on 13 January 2019 at The Scholar School, New Delhi. 58 women participated in this workshop.



NATIONAL ADVANCED TRAINING WORKSHOP

Society for Bright Future (SBF) organized a 5-day National Advanced Training workshop for the selected 60 volunteers from 11 states of India on 23-27 February 2019 at IDEAS campus, Nagpur, Maharashtra. The volunteers received training on modules of disaster management and adventure techniques i.e. first aid, fire-fighting, rescue operation, flood rescue and rock climbing.



STATE TRAINING WORKSHOPS

SBF conducted 2-days training workshops for its volunteers in five states such as Madhya Pradesh, Assam, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal and Delhi. Around 308 participants received training on disaster management.





MEDICAL SERVICE SOCIETY



Medical Service Society is established to work in the field of Healthcare with an emphasis on professional and ethical practices. MSS works with various partners during natural and man-made calamities to cater to the emergency medical needs of victims of the disasters.

MSS is coordinating physicians of various departments and formulating programs for poor and needy patients across the country. MSS has a good network of doctors and nursing staffs to deliver its services as mentioned below:

DE-ADDICTION CAMPAIGN

Medical Service Society organized various awareness programs and lectures related with the state-level De-addiction campaign in Maharashtra. MSS Akola doctors participated in a human chain to raise awareness against addiction and substance abuse. MSS organized 15 lectures on de-addiction in schools and colleges.





MICROFINANCE

SAHULAT MICROFINANCE SOCIETY was established under Vision 2016 program as a specialized organisation to focus on the economic development of under-privileged and weaker people especially the Muslim Community in India.

INTEREST FREE MICROFINANCE

Sahulat's Interest Free Microfinance Program through its affiliated credit cooperative societies, focuses on the efforts that empower communities to lift themselves out of poverty. Focusing on sustainable development, Sahulat ensures self-reliance and reduces community dependence upon an external aid. Sahulat believes that progress of the community cannot be achieved without sustainable development.

SAHULAT aims at:

- Undertaking and promoting need based research and developing different products and financial instruments for IFMFI.
- Establishing training institutes and data banks for IFMFI, evolving internal check system and audit facilities and coordination with affiliated institutions.
- Advocating with policy makers for a justifiable national policy on Interest Free Microfinance in India.
- Facilitating, promoting and developing Interest Free Microfinance Institutions (IFMFI).
