

FROM CHAIRMAN'S DESK

In 2021, the world including our country was forced to face another wave of Covid-19 pandemic, which was far more severe and fatal and took millions of lives. Our country also struggled to cope with the challenge it threw. By the time, the severity of the issue was realized, lakhs of lives were lost. We are glad that with the assistance of our partnering NGOs under the aegis of Vision 2026, we could rise up to the occasion and provide much needed relief through various interventions.

Vision also saw a major setback in 2021 in the form of the demise of Prof Siddique Hasan, the visionary behind Vision 2026. An irreparable loss indeed! Vision also lost one of its pillars Nusrat Ali, and many of our front workers to Covid.

Apart from the ongoing projects under core sectors, this year, various programs were undertaken in response to the Covid pandemic. Our major focus lied on providing hospital facilities when the whole country was reeling under the shortage of hospital and ICU beds, oxygen, and ventilators. The existing multispecialty hospital in Delhi was upgraded and a 40-bedded Covid Field Hospital setup. One Oxygen generating plant was also set up and the mobile medical vans and medical centres provided round-the-clock service to fight Covid-19. Oxygen cylinders, concentrators, and ventilators were also made available in different parts of the country. The Covid Handholding Project, one of its kind initiatives, was launched to provide livelihood support to

thousands who lost their livelihood due to Covid.

One of the major initiatives in the year 2021 was the launch of Project Ehsas, a hunger relief project in Kolkata and New Delhi. Under this initiative, community kitchens with a capacity of 10000 meals a day were set up and cooked meals were distributed in slum areas and to the migrant laborers facing hunger due to Covid-induced livelihood loss.

We also upped our activities in the under-developed aspirational districts of the country and are in the process of creating and developing Comprehensive Campuses that comprise educational institutions including schools, medical and wellness centres, and training and skill development centres. The Model Village Project implemented under the Vision now covers 50 villages in 15 districts of nine states with more than one lakh beneficiaries.

Despite the prevalent challenges, the dedicated team of all partnering NGOs and institutions behind Vision 2026 are committed to achieve the targets set in each sector. I express heartfelt gratitude to our donors, our partners, and our team for all that we could achieve. Your selfless benevolence and support continued to enable Vision to make a real difference in many lives.





CAPACITY BUILDING OF EXISTING SCHOOLS

Lots of studies have confirmed the fact that school infrastructure plays a vital role in the education and development of a student. There is a large number of schools in the country without even basic infrastructures. Our School Capacity Building Project aims at rehabilitating such schools by adopting or providing them with the necessary funds to develop their basic minimum infrastructure.

In 2021, 16 schools across the country were assisted- 32 classrooms, 1 hostel building, furniture (for 3 schools), 1 computer centre, 1 principal room, 1 staffroom, 18 toilets

















Every year, Vision 2026 provides undergraduate and postgraduate scholarships to needy students across the country based on their academic performances, economic background, and social commitment.

45 students from 12 states were given Merit cum Means Scholarship during 2021. The special scholarship was given to 247 students, among them 9 were given scholarships to study abroad and 119 were students from Delhi violence-affected families.










CENTRE FOR TRAINING AND ACADEMIC GUIDANCE- CTAG



CTAG is one of our promising projects which aims at providing and organizing career guidance and counseling activities and programs all over the country. CAREER GUIDANCE SESSIONS

CTAG conducts career guidance and counseling sessions for students to facilitate their admission and career selection process. In 2021, **42** sessions were conducted benefitting **2751** students from seven states-New Delhi, UP, Bihar, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal.

INDIVIDUAL CAREER COUNSELLING

In 2021, **656** individual queries from all over India were taken up by CTAG through our website and social media pages.

PSYCHOMETRIC ASSESSMENT

Psychometric Assessments are tests conducted to help students on stream/career selection. In 2021, we carried out **183** psychometric career assessments for students belonging to different states.

CAREER MITRS TRAINING

We train career volunteers (called Career Mitrs) from different states aiming at making career guidance and counselling accessible to the grassroots. In 2021, we organized **7** training programs training for **123** Career Mitrs from seven states New Delhi, UP, Bihar, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal. These Career Mitrs are functioning as resource persons in their respective states and are carrying out career guidance activities.




RESEARCH GUIDANCE PROGRAM



AL SHIFA MULTISPECIALTY HOSPITAL, NEW DELHI

Al Shifa Multispecialty Hospital facilitates **20** departments including diagnostic centres with a total number of **342** qualified staff. In collaboration with the Govt. of Delhi, Al Shifa is also running a free vaccination centre. In 2021, around **109853** people were the beneficiaries of the hospital services. Rs. **43,38,773** was spent by Al Shifa for free/charitable services.

UPCOMING PROJECT



150-BEDDED MULTISPECIALTY HOSPITAL IN LUCKNOW

150-Bedded Multispecialty Hospital in Lucknow is an upcoming project of Vision. The hospital is to be built in a 60,000 sqft area in a 2-acre compound. The estimated budget for the project is INR 52 Cr. A boundary wall has been constructed around the land and the land survey and mutation have already been done.



RESPONSE TO COVID-19 SECOND WAVE

Vision actively involved in relief and rehabilitation programs during the devastating second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic.





Vision 2026 established a 40-bedded Covid Field Hospital in Jamia Nagar, Delhi associating with Aster Volunteers and Al Shifa Multispecialty Hospital. The hospital was equipped with 100 oxygen cylinders, 10 oxygen concentrators, nebulization facilities, separate wards for positive patients, men and women without symptoms, nursing staff, and regular three-course meals for patients. All services at Field Hospital, including treatment and meals, were provided free to all patients.

OXYGEN GENERATION PLANT AT AL SHIFA HOSPITAL

An Oxygen Generation Plant of Orlane 600 model was installed at Al-Shifa Multispecialty Hospital, New Delhi during the second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Plant consists of Air Compressor, Dryer and Filtration System, Air Receiver, Oxygen Generator, Oxygen Surge Tank.











MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDED

118 oxygen cylinders and 77 oxygen concentrator machines were donated to various hospitals, clinics, and medical centres in Delhi, Bihar, Maharashtra, UP, Telangana, and Kerala. 6 ventilators and 3 dialysis machines were donated to Al-Shifa Hospital, New Delhi.


HYGIENE KITS

555 hygiene kits were distributed among frontline health workers and slum dwellers in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and Madya Pradesh

MEDICAL CENTRES

Vision constructs/supports medical centres in rural and backward villages to provide affordable and quality basic medical services. Free medical camps, health check-up programs and awareness sessions are also conducted in these medical centres. So far, we have constructed 14 medical centres in different parts of the country. In 2021, three new medical centres were constructed in Murshidabad and Baruipur, West Bengal and Palakkad, Kerala.









MOBILE MEDICAL VANS

Through this program, Vision organizes mobile medical camps in slums and slum-like places. We are running two mobile medical vans, in Delhi (Jointly operated by Human Welfare Foundation, Al Shifa Multispeciality Hospital, Aster Volunteers) and another in Jamshedpur, Jharkhand. Through this program, in 2021, we organized

469 camps benefitting 24,107 people





MOBILE ICU & AMBULANCE

In 2021, Vision donated one mobile ICU to Al-Shifa Hospital, New Delhi and three ambulances to West Bengal Welfare Trust, Kolkata, Khidmat Welfare Trust, Lucknow, and Al Falah Hospital, Azamgarh.









MEDICAL CAMPS & WORKSHOPS

4 medical camps were organized in Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, and Jharkhand benefitting 967 people. Three health workshops on first aid were conducted in Jabalpur (MP), Ranchi (Jharkhand), and Roorkee (Uttarakhand) where 102 people from different districts of the states were participants. One workshop on Drug Abuse Prevention was also organized in Shikrawa, Haryana with 110 participants.









HEARING IMPAIRED CHILDREN GET COCHLEAR IMPLANT

Vision provided Cochlear Implant (an electronic device that partially restores hearing) to two hearing-impaired children, Ayush (7) and Piyush (5). Mr. Vishwendra (DM, South-East Dist., Delhi) handed over the cheque to the beneficiaries in the presence of Mr. P.R. Tripathi (ADM).





MEDICAL AID

We provide financial assistance to poor patients who are unable to afford their healthcare expenses. In 2021, we provided assistance to 96 poor patients.



SENSOR-BASED ARTIFICIAL ARMS FOR AKRAM KHAN

Akram Khan, a resident of Mustafabad, New Delhi, worked as a tailor. The 2020 Delhi violence gutted down his shop. Akram was severely injured losing both his hands and went into a deep depression as he lost both hands as well as his source of livelihood.

Vison 2026 came to know Akram's heart-breaking story and extended its assistance providing him with sensor-based artificial arms worth Rs. 11 lakhs. The advantages of these arms are multifarious as he may be able to do any work and even write as well as use a desktop computer. The fixing of arms has made life easy for him. He is now able to do the work he was doing earlier. The sensor-based artificial arms work as normal hands perfectly coordinated by signals from the brain.





BLOOD DONATION CAMP

A Blood Donation Camp was organized by Vision 2026 in Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh associating with the Victoria Hospital, Jabalpur, and the Indian Red Cross Society, at which 50 persons donated blood.





HEALTHCARE AWARENESS PROGRAMS



10 health awareness programs were organized as part of World Health Day and World Diabetes Day in Darrrang (Assam), Seoni, Ujjain, and Jabalpur (Madhya Pradesh), Jaunpur and Kanpur (Uttar Pradesh), in Purnea (Bihar), and Ranchi (Jharkhand).

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT BANK

Vison sets up medical equipment banks where hospital beds, wheelchairs, etc will be provided to poor and needy patients for temporary use for free. The first of this kind was inaugurated in Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh.





AYUSHMAN BHARAT AROGYA CARD CAMP

Ayushman Bharat Arogya Card Camp was held in Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh. More than 150 applications were received in the camp.
Ayushman Bharat Arogya Card is used to avail health care services at an empanelled hospital, public or private, anywhere in the country through the Ayushman Bharat Yojana - National Health Protection Scheme which has now been renamed Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana.

DRINKING WATER PROJECT

Water is a basic human necessity and a vital natural resource for all aspects of life. Unfortunately, access to clean water is a right that has been denied to many of the poorest people in the country. Vision 2026 recognizes the critical importance of the issue and focuses on the most-affected areas to tackle the water crisis by providing people with sources of clean water.





LOW-COST HOUSING

India is home to the largest homeless population in the world. Millions of poor who cannot afford to buy a roof over their head end up on the footpaths and flyovers of flourishing metros of the country. Vision provides financial aid to homeless people living in the least developed villages in various North Indian states. Victims of natural calamities are given priority under the housing aid project.

62 low-cost housing projects were executed in 2020 in the states of West Bengal, Jharkhand, Haryana, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Assam, Delhi, Bihar, and Kerala.











COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTRE

Children in remote areas lack access to formal schooling and education. HWF provides support for establishing Community Learning Centres in such areas to impart basic education to the out-of-school children in order to make them ready for formal education. In addition to the education support, we do necessary efforts for their socioeconomic, moral, and cultural development.

Currently, we are running three centres in Delhi, West Bengal, and Haryana. One centre is under construction in Mustafabad, Delhi

COMMUNITY CENTRE

In 2021, we implemented 38 community centre projects in the states of Assam, Bihar, Jharkhand, Rajasthan, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal. 12 community centres were supported with various essential items including CCTV cameras, air conditions, coolers, water fridges, invertors, etc.

Nagrik Vikas Kendra (NVK) works as a bridging agency between different government departments and the downtrodden people to avail them of the benefit of such government schemes. NVKs are not only creating awareness among the masses but also supporting the beneficiaries until they receive the final output in the form of money or document.

Currently, we have 30 centres in the states of Delhi, Haryana, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Telangana, UP, Jharkhand, West Bengal, Orissa, and Assam.

In 2021, through the efforts of NVKs, people applied for INR 428.99 million and availed INR 45 million through 126 different Govt. schemes. 14746 welfare cards/documents of 41 types were also issued. NVK's services reached 30000+ beneficiaries.

HUNGER RELIEF









India has slipped to the 102nd position (of 117 countries) in the Global Hunger Index (GHI) 2019, slipping from its 2018 position of 95 and behind its neighbors Nepal, Pakistan, and Bangladesh. Poverty is a major hindrance to the growth of any society. Keeping this in mind, Vision implements the Hunger Relief Program helping thousands of people fight hunger. Under the program, we provide food kits to the neediest twice a year and distribute cooked food packets daily through our community kitchens in Delhi and Kolkata under a new project called 'Project Ehsas'.

In 2021, we distributed 1310 food kits for refugees in 18 refugee camps in Hyderabad, Jaipur, Nuh, Faridabad, and Delhi. During the year, we could reach more than 9.32 lakhs poor and needy people in 24 states. We focused most deserving areas across the country.



Feeding with a smile

We commenced 'Project Ehsas' in October 2021 by setting up community kitchens in the cities of Kolkata and Delhi where a large number of migrant workers and slum dwellers struggle to manage the expenses for essentials. The project is to serve the cooked meal to the downtrodden and was initiated in the wake of worsening hunger crisis due to the Covid-19 induced lockdowns and consequent loss of jobs in India. We are planning to set up more kitchens in other cities as well. Under the program, in three months from the commencement, we have distributed more than 85,000 food packets.



500 COVID-19 HANDHOLDING PROJECTS

Vision 2026 addresses the root causes of poverty through long-term solutions which promote sustainable livelihood. Under Economic Empowerment Project, we establish Vocational Training Centres (VTC) and execute self-employment programs in order to achieve this sustainable livelihood goal.



VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTRES

Vision 2026 establishes Vocational Training Centres (VTC) to provide short-term job-oriented courses. These courses are designed to make youth especially from backward communities capable of securing decent jobs in various industries. Currently, Vision runs 7 such centres in Delhi, Haryana, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Manipur, and Rajasthan.

SELF-EMPLOYMENT AND SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM

This program intends at supporting poor households with opportunities for income enhancement leading towards economic mobility. Under the program, we provide individuals and communities with training in small-scale skills and interest-free business loans which offer them dignified and well sustainable ways to make a living.

During this year, we implemented **173** projects in the states of Delhi, Bihar, Assam, Jharkhand, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, and Rajasthan providing livelihood means such as e-rickshaw, auto rickshaw, kiosk, bike, cycle, wheel cart, small business shop, service centre, production unit, goat farm, etc.









VOCATIONAL TRAINING WORKSHOPS

We conduct vocational training workshops to help underprivileged segments of the society improve their technical skills, enhance their employability level and enable them for employment and entrepreneurship.

In 2021, we organized four-day workshops for automobile technicians in Haryana, Maharashtra, and Rajasthan providing successful training for 90 technicians. Vision also conducted workshops in Maharashtra for solar electricians associating with NSDC providing training for 212 participants.





COVID HANDHOLDING PROJECT

COVID-19 pandemic and the lockdowns have adversely impacted individual lives of the middle class and lower middle class irrespective of their caste, creed, and gender. It has brought economical and financial challenges for the marginalized and low-income groups from the unorganized sector. 'COVID-19 Handholding Project' is an initiative by Vision to brave this unprecedented situation, to ensure our contribution in handholding of the needy in their challenging times and to play our part in the nation-building.

The project aims at providing financial assistance in the form of loans to the individuals whose livelihood activities got adversely affected due to the COVID pandemic and related restrictions. This project also addresses the issues of micro and small livelihood activities. So far, as the first phase, we have implemented 500+ livelihood projects in different parts of the country.

In India, women are facing severe social inequalities. According to a 2020 report by Right to Education Forum and Centre for Budget Policy Studies with support of the World Bank and UNICEF, nearly 40% of adolescent girls in the age group of 15-18 years are not attending school while 30% of girls from poorest families have never set foot in a classroom.

Empowering poor and marginalized women is one of the key goals of the Vision right from its inception. Through our projects, we aim to assist the women community through various educational, healthcare and income-generating initiatives.




Vision designed Village Project to actively participate in the nation-building process by transforming villages as 'Model Villages' through long-term projects and systematic intervention strategies. Under the Project, efforts are being made to improve the socio-economic condition of the residents of the adopted villages with better accessibility to health, education and livelihood.

The project is effectively running in 50 villages of 15 districts in 9 states of the country. The project has proven to be very effective and efficient in delivering its services to the village community. Presently we are focusing on six major sectors (Health, Education, Skill Development & Livelihood, Women empowerment, Agriculture and Environment, Water sanitation & Hygiene) with an objective of overall development and empowerment of the village community.





EDUCATION






In rural India, basic education is still a luxury for millions of children. The education of children fails to become a major concern for many rural families struggling to meet their basic needs. Poor educational infrastructure combined with the unfavorable socio-economic state of remote villages results in unsatisfactory educational status at all levels



including primary schools. One Teacher School is a unique project tailored to address this issue related to primary education in selected villages. The project utilizes locally available resources and provides a platform to the children of primary schooling age, i.e., 6-10 years.

Project interventions include identification of children through door-to-door survey, foundation/bridge classes, school enrolment of children, and most importantly awareness building among the villagers. One dedicated teacher from the community itself is appointed to teach the children. In 2021, we are running 7 One Teacher Schools enrolling 327 students.

MALNUTRITION FREE VILLAGES

According to Global Nutrition Report 2020, 34.7% of children in India under 5 years of age are stunted, which is higher than the average for the Asia region (21.8%). Reports indicate that malnutrition in rural areas is substantially higher that in urban areas. Our Malnutrition Free Villages Program was started in 2020-21 and is designed with a broader goal of making adopted villages malnutrition-free. The program puts a great emphasis on educating parents and bringing behavioral changes in dietary habits and hygiene practices. Implementation of the Program will be done through Village Health Committee and working closely with govt's front-line workers. In 2021, we provided nutrition support to 663 malnourished children in our adopted villages.


OPEN DEFECATION FREE VILLAGE

The National Statistical Office report (2018) which covered more than 100,000 households across rural and urban India found that in rural areas, only 71.3% of households have access to a toilet-less than three-quarters. Through this program, HWF constructs cost effective toilets at the household level to help rural communities get full access to the 'Right to Sanitation'. Under the program, in 2021, we constructed 170 toilets in different parts of the country.




The number of illiterate and semi-literate women is quite high in our adopted villages. To address this issue, we started Adult Female Literacy Program in selected model villages during 2020-21. The program has been tailored to meet the educational need of rural women (above 18 years) through the provision of functional literacy classes in their village itself. Till now we are running total 27 centres in 24 villages and nearly 550+ women have been enrolled.

We have a dedicated organization called Society for Bright Future- SBF specializing in emergency relief and rehabilitation responding to all natural and man-made disasters. The organization banks upon its large pool of trained, skilled and dedicated volunteers across the country.

Through this project, SBF intends to team up with the local government bodies, corporates, local community leaders and grassroot volunteers to execute a sustained sanitation drive at 100 different locations across the country.
