

Al Jamia Off Campus, in Siddique Hassan Knowledge Campus Mewat is run under the aegis of HWF. It affiliated to Al-Jamia Al Islamia, Santhapuram. It offers two-year program for 11th and 12th graders, hostel facilities for both genders. In the last academic year 78 students have got enrolled in which 30 were girl students.



Al Shifa Multispeciality Hospital, New Delhi

1,60,380 IPD/OPD beneficiaries ₹39,98,515 for free/ charitable services ₹30,50,700 for free medicines (on MRP) through mobile medical van Al Shifa Multispeciality Hospital facilitates around 20 departments including diagnostic centres with a total number of 360+ qualified staff. In collaboration with the Govt. of Delhi, Al Shifa is also running a free vaccination centre. In 2024, around 1,60,380 people were the beneficiaries of the hospital services. Rs. 39,,98,515/- was spent by Al Shifa for free/charitable services. Free medicines worth Rs. 30,50,700/- on MRP were dispensed to the beneficiaries through the mobile medical van program.







Our hunger relief reached **1,02,000 families** in 22 states

In India a significant portion of the population still faces food insecurity, with many struggling to access adequate nutrition, particularly in vulnerable communities, leading to health issues like malnutrition and stunted growth, impacting their overall development and quality of life.

Poverty is a major hindrance to the growth of any society. Keeping this in mind, Vision implements the Hunger Relief Program helping thousands of people fight hunger. Under the program, we provide food kits to the neediest twice a year. In 2024, we could reach 1,02,000 families in 22 states of the country.



The project is to serve the cooked meal to the needy and downtrodden through community kitchens and was initiated in the wake of the worsening hunger crisis due to the Covid- 19 induced lockdowns and consequent loss of jobs in India. Currently, we are distributing cooked meals in hungers spots in Delhi and Lucknow. Under the program, in 2024, we distributed more than 2.03 lac food packets.

Response to Emergencies

The Society for Bright Future (SBF) has been at the forefront of disaster relief efforts, this year responding to various emergencies across multiple states, including:

Floods: Assam, Bihar, UP, Punjab, and Gujarat Fires: Bengal, Haryana, Delhi, and Bihar Cyclones, Landslides, and Train Accidents: Gujarat, Kerala, Jharkhand, and Bihar. The people were helped with Medical Relief Camps, Ready-to-Eat Meals, Baby

Project Rahat

With dipping temperatures, in north India, and no warm clothes to protect them from the chill, hundreds of homeless die every winter in India. Project Rahat aims at protecting the homeless/needy people from the killing weather in the winter and minimizing cold wave-induced fatalities among them. This year, The Society for Bright Future (SBF) has successfully distributed over 15,641 blankets in 14 states, ensuring warmth and comfort during harsh winters.

A total of 209 Places covered across North India, including families, children, elderly individuals, and homeless populations, were prioritized for support.

This impactful effort reflects SBF's dedication to mitigating hardships and fostering well-being among those most in need.
