VISION ACADEMIC CITY



The Vision Academic City in Nuh (Mewat), Haryana, a flagship initiative of the Human Welfare Foundation under Vision 2026, Established on 24 acres of land, the Academic City seeks to address the severe developmental challenges of Mewat—ranked the lowest among India’s 101 aspirational districts—by providing affordable, quality education and essential community services.

Key institutions already operational include the Al-Jamia Off-Campus Centre, comprising a Degree College, Senior Secondary School, and hostels for boys and girls. In addition, a Middle School and a Community Centre are also functioning independently.

Planned developments include The Scholar School, a Skill Development Centre, a Central Library, an Auditorium, a Commercial Block, a Multi-speciality Hospital, a Paramedical Institute, staff quarters, and other allied facilities.



School Kit Distribution

Despite rising enrolment in North India, many children still miss out on education due to poverty and social exclusion. To bridge this gap, the Human Welfare Foundation (HWF) runs the School Kit Distribution Program, providing notebooks, pens, and school bags to underprivileged children. Focusing on rural, slum, and tribal areas, the program encourages school attendance and reduces dropouts. In 2025, more than 2700+ kits were distributed in 13 states.





In January 2022, Vision announced a new PG scholarship program in the name of our Founder GS, and the chief architect of the Vision project Prof. K.A Siddique Hassan. The scholarship is a yearly program intended at supporting young talents from the most marginalized communities in the country. Target beneficiaries of the scholarship are PG students with potential leadership qualities who are in their first semester studying in premier institutes in the country. So far 150+ students were awarded the scholarship.

WBCS Residential Coaching Centre in Kolkata

WBCS Coaching Program is a promising project initiated by Vision under CTAG. The program aims at providing residential coaching for West Bengal Civil Service. Under the program, we started a residential coaching centre in Kolkata, West Bengal. So far 59 students in 4 batches have received coaching. Total 19 students have qualified prelims exams and 13 of them secured government jobs.

This is the first of its kind as the organization is planning to set up such centres in other underperforming districts as well.

Other initiatives: Research Guidance Program

CTAG acts as a promoter of research by motivating students to conduct research activities as well as a supporter of research by guiding research scholars through their research. We support PhD scholars and post-graduate/graduate scholars who wish to conduct research in the future.

Under this program, CTAG in collaboration with Jamia Millia Islamia organized a three-day National Intensive Writers' Clinic (NIWC). Held at the School of Education Building, the clinic aimed to strengthen academic writing skills among emerging scholars, focusing on APA 7th Edition guidelines. 40+ scholars participated in the workshop.

SKILL DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP ON HOME PRODUCT MAKING

A one-day Skill Development Workshop on Home Product Making was conducted in Rampur, with the objective of empowering women through self-employability and improved livelihood opportunities.

The workshop trained 90 women in producing marketable household products such as detergent powder, dishwash, handwash, soap, and floor, toilet, and glass cleaners. The initiative enhanced entrepreneurial confidence, financial awareness, and readiness for home-based micro-enterprises, contributing meaningfully to women's socio-economic empowerment.



SELF-EMPLOYMENT AND SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM

Vision Livelihood project focuses on empowering marginalized communities across India by providing financial assistance, skill-building opportunities, and market access. We support needy households with opportunities for income enhancement leading toward economic mobility.

In 2025, Masawat Livelihood Foundation supported 28 entrepreneurs and trained 50+ women, converting skills into sustainable livelihoods. Rs. 5.15 lakh was deployed through a revolving, interest-free model, ensuring fund reusability. With 54% women participation, operations in Uttar Pradesh, Assam, Delhi, and West Bengal.



28 ENTREPRENEURS DIRECTLY SUPPORTED

During 2025, Masawat Livelihood Foundation directly supported 28 low-income entrepreneurs, enabling them to start or scale micro-enterprises across diverse trades and sectors, strengthening household income and local economies.



50+ WOMEN TRAINED

More than 50 women received livelihood-focused training, equipping them with practical skills that translated into income-generating activities and improved economic self-reliance.



LeadHERship 2025



LeadHERship 2025, a two-day National Women NGO Conclave held on 8–9 October 2025, was jointly organised by TWEET and Jamia Hamdard to strengthen women’s leadership in India’s civil society sector.

The conclave convened 240 delegates from 47 NGOs, 12 states, and 8 educational institutions, including women leaders, grassroots activists, academicians, policymakers, and civil society professionals.

The programme featured an inaugural session, thematic technical sessions led by 32 expert resource persons, and a valedictory session. Key themes included women’s leadership, innovative NGO practices, fundraising, governance, legal compliance, and future pathways for a resilient women-led NGO ecosystem.

Mewat Women Empowerment Project

To address low female literacy and limited opportunities for women in Nuh District (Mewat), Haryana, TWEET implemented targeted interventions under its Mewat Women Empowerment Project.

A multi-stakeholder roundtable consultation held on 26 April 2025 at the HWF Mewat Campus brought together nearly 100 participants, including government officials and frontline workers, to identify local challenges and sustainable pathways for women's empowerment.

Based on these insights, 17 meritorious girls received scholarships for higher education, alongside community-based initiatives to improve educational access, build capacities, and enhance awareness among girls and women.



Presence of Sahuat Microfinance


Growth in Branches




Growth in affiliated Cooperatives
